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JACKIE [00:00:00] Dating can be interesting just because, one there's the language and there's the cultural distinctions. One is language, for instance, for me dating in Spanish is not necessarily difficult because my Spanish is fairly good. But yet many of the nuances to who I am, are all in English, if that makes sense. I always feel like if I'm dating someone in the Spanish language, do they really get to know like, be authentic complete me. Because I feel like they're still even though my Spanish is fairly good. There's still part of me that is, I almost feel like box within the English language, if that makes sense. And then there are various cultural issues. When I think about the whole idea of masculinity and chivalry, particularly in Africa and South and Central America. Men can be very, very chivalrous in ways that I never really experienced in the United States of America.

CHRISTINE [00:01:01] Hey, everyone, welcome back to Flourish In The Foreign, the podcast that elevates and affirms the voices and stories of Black women living and thriving, and just generally doing the damn thing abroad. While also exploring living abroad as a pathway to wellness, I'm talking about financial, wellness, mental, physical, spiritual, professional, all of the wellness is, and this podcast aims to not only inspire you and let you know that we are out here doing it, but also really give you some tips, some anecdotes, some real life tools for you to go abroad and cultivate a life well lived. I am your host, Christine Job, and I am an American expat currently living in Barcelona, I am not only a podcaster. But I'm also a business strategist, that helps Black women and women of color, leverage their skills, their talents into viable and sustainable online businesses, so that they can pursue thriving lives abroad, that leaves them professionally fulfilled, and you know, financially abundant in whatever ways that means for them. So, welcome to the podcast if you're new. Hey, if you are returning, hi, how have you been? Thank you so much for coming back. I appreciate it and this year is going to be super dope. I just want to tell you guys that right now. I am so hyped for 2021 and Flourish In The Foreign the stories that I have on deck, which I've been telling y'all since 2020. I know, but are so good. She is a, I mean, a badass. She knows what she's talking about. She's a recent hotel investor, she is on it. And I'm like, cool, but I can't talk to you guys all individually, right? What I can do is I can have a little like mini webinar or something I could chat. And if you are wanting to know, "You know everybody has a course Christine what makes your course different?" tune into (English word, inaudible) and I'll let you know. So that is happening. Yes, it is one of the questions that I'm asked all the time. And it's always brought up in living abroad, forums and some kind of way people want to know, what's a like, dating abroad. And that's what they want to know. And it's important because part of your holistic wellness is obviously partnering. If that's important to you, that's part of your life. visioning is important. And that's why I did this episode. So this episode is a compilation of 14 of my past guests who answered the question. What's it like? Dating abroad wherever you are, and they didn't hold back. So first up, we have Libya of the Chronicles abroad, podcast and all the other amazing things that she does. And although she is currently based in Tulum, Mexico, she is ordinarily kind of pre COVID life, a digital nomad. And so I asked her what it has been like dating around the world.

NUBIA [00:13:39] I think it was a little bit more difficult for me, because now I'm in my 40s, my generation, the Generation X community, we're out there, but a lot of us who are traveling are either traveling with our families or traveling with our mates, or just on different trajectories in our lives. It's the Generation Y and Z who just leave University and they just globetrotting the world and they have a party and they're having fun, and they're able to find this love and connection

abroad. I just haven't found that. Also, not only am I African American woman over 40 am an African American woman who's a lesbian and over 40, there was all of these things that I won't call them roadblocks, but I just would say that it was just a little bit more difficult for me to find that community or and I don't, typically I haven't, I haven't had relationships outside of my race. It wasn't that I was seeking other ethnicities either. But I would have been more apt to date somebody else had I dated men and had I dated somebody who was of a different race.

CHRISTINE [00:14:43] Nubia who identifies as a lesbian woman and I want to know how that has affected her travel decisions and how she is treated abroad.

NUBIA [00:14:55] The thing about that is being a woman who loves women that have nothing to do with me going to a country and understanding their cultural norms, like I stated, I'm not going to go into Dubai and try to hold someone's hand that is of the same sex, I'm just not going to do it. I don't care how much you want to say you love me? Because that's disrespectful, and it can get us killed. Do you understand what I mean? You have to understand the countries you're going to, period. It's not necessarily, accept it that much in the States, depending on what state you're in. At the end of the day, I just am a woman first, then I'm a Black woman, then I'm a lesbian woman. Does that make sense? I just when I walk into a room, I don't have the gay flag across my face or tattooed on my forehead, I don't do that. And on top of that, I am not masculine. Identify it doesn't show outwardly, as if some women who might be more masculine of center and wear masculine clothing. To that extent, yes, you have to be mindful and careful where you go. For instance, I will just say the UAE or the Middle East in general, you could be arrested for what they call gender impersonation. A woman wearing male's clothing is not received well there. Now, as a tourist, you have a little bit more leeway because you're putting money into the economy. But it's when you're living there, or you're outside of like the tourist places. Even as a straight woman, you can't go to the Middle East with your boyfriend, let's say you're not married. You go to a hotel, and there's only one bed? Absolutely not. Absolutely not. That is a no go that can get you locked up premarital sex, and a country that doesn't believe in it. That's against the law. And a hotel may or may not call the police on you. Or they may or may not reject that room and say that you need to separate beds or two separate rooms. There's all these things. People need to understand that with travel, comes educating yourself. You have to educate yourself, don't just go somewhere blindly. Because you're looking at somebody's pictures and think like, Oh, I'm just gonna go there because it's beautiful. understand where you're walking into, understand the culture of that country. Understand that sometimes somebody's ID pics are totally disrespectful to that country. Depending. Thailand is good for stopping you at the airport to Thailand is good for stopping you at the airport. China monitors all the social media that goes in and out of that country. You have to be careful. We all know about the guy who went to North Korea and stole the propaganda and got arrested and they shipped his aspect to the US and he died immediately. Things like that in his real life. They don't play. You can't go to what country and disrespect their cultural norms period. I don't care whether you think it's right or you think it's wrong.

CHRISTINE [00:18:07] Next, we have Rachel, who is here in Barcelona. She is from Jamaica, and she came to Barcelona to pursue her PhD, which she already earned. So I guess I should

say Dr. Rachel, yes, Dr. Rachel. And so I asked her what has been her experience dating here in Barcelona.

RACHEL [00:18:29] So my dating life is kind of complicated, because I think through undergrad, but high school, boarding school, undergrad, law school, and then starting here, I was always in a relationship. So I never really did the dating thing. Dating in Barcelona, I think it's tough, especially if you want to be with a Black man, as a Black woman. If you want to be a Black man or have a black spouse. It's tough because there aren't any options. Really what I've seen with my really good friends or like my sisters, they found their guys you know, beautiful Black love couples on the Tinder and know what I think based on everybody else's experiences on the Tinder. I personally think that my two sisters probably found the only two good ones on the entire app. I'm a little bit scared to try anything like that. So I wouldn't have done it, but they have done it and they were successful. So I guess it's possible. I just don't know if it's probably because everybody else has told me there's nothing out there. And you can see that on the streets. There just aren't many Black men available and the black men that are there are with White woman, but right now I'm not really looking. I think this would not be a good place to look though. If I were not a good place.

CHRISTINE [00:19:59] You guys been listening to the podcasts for a while, you know that I had Valerie on the show pretty early on. And Valerie is from California, but is living in Australia. And she came to Australia as a professional basketball player. And now she is just like a multi passionate entrepreneur, doing so many great things. And so I asked her about her experience dating in Australia.

VALERIE [00:20:27] Well, I'm married to a white Australian man, I, I guess I've been pretty blessed in that way that I was able to find a husband here. But dating life in Australia was challenging because the pickings are slim. But I talked to my little sister. And in California, she says the same thing right now. So I guess it's not really that different. But in my experience, I felt like when I would date, they would put emphasis on my race. Oh, never talked to a Black girl before. There's no African American men here. So your options are, you know, Australians, which are predominately white Australians, like African men, which is still a very small percentage. And then you have an even smaller percentage of Sri Lankan, Asian and also Aboriginal men. So the main ones that were approached me were White Australian men, and it was always a thing of me being black was something that I don't think they were necessarily always comfortable with. Because interracial dating here is not common. You rarely see it. And if you do see it, it's typically Asian woman in a White men. So similar to San Francisco. I almost felt like, "Oh, I'm not gonna find anyone here." And I started online dating. It was horrible in the beginning. And I remember this point, I was like, you know what I'm done feeling this need to be with someone. Because I feel like that is the real issue at hand, this desire and this pressure to find someone at a certain age and have children and all these things. I felt that pressure from growing up and those expectations from society, and definitely from my parents, I felt like I was dating from the space of neediness. I feel like they could sense that. So they weren't really drawn to me. I remember the day where I was like, I'm done. And I deleted the app and I was like, I'm just going to enjoy my life in the way that it is. And I'm just going to enjoy being single.

As soon as I did that, I met my husband. It's just so funny how things come to you when you let them go. That's one thing I would just if anyone is keen to move here and they're single and they're open to dating. Just be yourself and don't even really go looking for it because it all will always come to you when it's meant to.

CHRISTINE [00:22:48] Next we have a Karla and she has been abroad for I believe the past 10 years in seven different countries in higher ed. And she just had a fantastic episode. So if you haven't heard it, be sure to listen to it. And I asked her about her experience dating all around the world.

KARLA [00:23:13] My philosophy on date is I date who likes me. And I know that is very broad. That means I date outside my race. If folks really want to know the blatant truth I gave who likes me and I look at as a date, these are opportunities to meet potential suitors. But I have not made that a huge focus. Now I will say that in the past almost eight years that I have been living out consecutively. I did get married and divorced while I've been abroad. And no, I did not marry a US citizen. They did marry someone off my race. And it didn't work for a variety of reasons. But that has not discouraged me from continuing to date. I took some time to heal from my divorce and I am now back at the place where I'm open and willing to date and willing to potentially look at long term relationship that may lead to another marriage. I go out and enjoy myself. I do a lot of things solo, whether that's going to the movies, five star restaurants, traveling, I may have a date while I'm on a vacation in the country and it may not work and I was like okay, great. It was lovely meeting you and having dinner with you.

CHRISTINE [00:24:40] Next we have Jamila and Jamila is based in Buenos itis. And if you remember her episode, she actually landed in Buenos itis via Tango, the dance and I mean her story of how she even got into Tango is like a movie. So if you haven't heard that episode, highly recommend To check that one out, as well. And so I had to ask her, what was it like dating in the tango capital of the world?

JAMILA [00:25:08] Oh, dating. It's fun. I feel like the men here are interesting. There is a word they use, like hysterical, hysterical, which kind of I think accurately represents all of the dating culture and when it's nice, are in Argentina. And it's this kind of game, I think that everybody has agreed to play where there's just a lot of unnecessary drama in relationships, I do think the men as compared to the United States are more in touch with their feelings. For better or worse, you hear about them there and their feelings a lot, and how they feel about everything. And so I just feel like there's like a lot of this kind of drama, this going back and forth, that you kind of have to engage in. I think it's just a cultural kind of game that you play in dating. I think as a Black woman, there is the shadow of how Black women are represented on TV or in music culture, that you do have to pay attention to, especially when you're, you know, first meeting people, I definitely have met some wonderful men here. And then I've had great relationships with, but definitely run into guys that it felt like they were just wanting to see to try it out. Because they had only seen it on TV or wherever they were watching maybe on their computers, trying to discern that when you're first meeting someone if you're interested in them, and how you feel about that, personally, realize that I am different, that I am unique that I do stand out that

technically classified me as exotic in this culture. And so there's going to be some of that. But then I think I also am mindful of not wanting to be fetishized either. I think there's a balance to that. I always feel like I'm kind of always playing here. I think it's gotten better, as I've been here longer as my Spanish gets better. My ability to kind of weed that out from the beginning.

CHRISTINE [00:27:41] Next we have Halona and she really shared her story of how the International Development Peace Corps landed her really doing a lot of work on the continent of Africa and how she really got physical and mental and emotional healing by moving to Asia. And I wanted to know about her experience dating abroad and her experience dating abroad, actually became dating and marrying abroad as well.

HALONA [00:28:10] I did one guy who actually became my husband. I probably met him maybe six months into my being in my village. He wasn't from my village, he was from the town, maybe 3040 minutes or so outside of my village. And I dated him. And we wound up falling in love with each other. And we got married. And so it was interesting. He was always really fascinated by other Black people in the experience of black people. In America, we're not together anymore, we wound up getting a divorce, probably eight years after we got married. But I appreciate the fact that I met him because I was able to learn more about his culture than if I had to just sort of figure it out on my own. So he sort of became like a cultural translator for me, if you will, during the two years that I was there in the country, I learned a lot about politics. I learned about the complication of religion, of being a Muslim, but also being able to follow certain traditional aspects of African religion as well, with just learning how people interact with with each other between tribes. Yeah, it was very, very interested in his father had four wives, and probably others. But there were four main wives. And so this was my first time learning about what it's like to be in a family of people with multiple wives. So it was just a period of a lot of firsts, a lot of expanding my mind on what, what is right. What does it mean to be to live right or to live? According to your culture, and trying to explain that to both sides of our families was very, very interesting.

CHRISTINE [00:30:06] I asked Halona to really talk more about the differences in dating culture that she noticed between Togo and the United States.

HALONA [00:30:16] I felt like, well, and this is also my perspective from 20 years ago. So I want to, my perspective now as a 42 year old woman, it was very different from what it was when I was 22. But when I was dating a Togolese man, I felt like he was a lot more attentive than probably what I was used to in the States. He seemed very interested in who I was. But you know, which kind of seems basic but even today, a lot of Americans they're just that I don't feel like they're very interested in who you are. And you know, what it is that you'd like to do, but they're, they're very good at the chase of running, you know, the chase, they like the chase of you saying, I am, you know, I'm not interested, you know, No, thank you. It's almost like they take that as a challenge. When you say no, that respectfully they keep, they'll keep coming back, just so that, you know, that they're serious about being interested in you, as a romantic partner. And so, you know, they kind of jump through hoops to sort of get your, your interest. So, whatever they need to do whatever they need to spend. And, you know, not that he came from a

very rich family because he didn't. But you know, whatever means he had at the time he was willing to invest it to get my attention, which was really nice.

CHRISTINE [00:31:47] All right. Next, we have Khephra and Khephra is New Orleans, Atlanta, all up in Madrid. And she is an auxiliary commerce (Spanish word, inaudible) in Madrid, and also a writer and a comedian. And I asked her all about her experience dating in Madrid, and has a bit of a warning in case you're around children or you have sensitive ears. This next section does contain explicit language.

KHEPHRA [00:32:23] Well, I mean, girl, the wolves are here to let me tell you that up front, live and in living color. Yeah, they should hear either girl. Now before you hashtag now they'll Spaniards me. I'm sure there are good ones. Some of my friends have gotten married, had children and everything. I seem to be finding the duds. And I'm a tough bitch to date. To be quite honest, I don't take a lot of shit. I'm a 40 year old woman. Patience has never been a virtue that I hold. And it's even less here. Because you are fetishized a lot as a Black woman. And people are men, especially because I'm bisexual. But men that I've encountered, they start by invoking your skin color. I get these intros, like Ola, Bumble into chocolate. Another guy said, "Oh, a Black beauty." And I'm like, "the horse?" Like son, you've already lost. What do you do with Spanish guys? They feel the need to tell you like, and they say the wording is very specific. I've never tried the Black girl before. Or I've never been with a Black woman before. And I'm just "That's nice. I have, I don't know where you're going with this." That always messes them up. And I'm like, "Well, I have so I wasn't curious if you've been with a Black woman or not Pedro." You can let that slide. I have no idea. But they say things like that, like you're supposed to be. "Oh. well, let me be your first." Nah, son. That's not gonna happen. I wasn't wondering actually, some Black women here in Europe are trafficked from other places. So some people seem confused with the fact that you are a Black woman here on your own. You chose to come here, you're traveling. You're American, and not a prostitute. I've been approached standing outside the metro in my most non-prostitute-ish wear, like, you know, literal jeans and a T-shirt Afro in full effect. And this dude comes up and asks me if I want to take a walk with Him. And I'm like, "I'm waiting for my mother." And he said, "To my surprise." I'm, "Yeah, dude. I have a mother. She'll be here any minute. What do you want?" He's already very brilliant. "Am I know what you want though? Well, let's take a walk." And I was like, "Do you need this to be 70 something you shouldn't want to take a walk with me," and I was like, "I'll take a walk with your grandson." Yeah, Damn, I'm 40 but I don't need to be trolling the nursing homes. (English words, inaudible). But you literally will be existing while Black and people approach you in the most sideways asked manners. I gave up on dating I, I cut it all Tinder, everything. Well, I was into someone that I had been seeing and talking to for a while and I got ghosted, and that really hurt. But people will just insult you here a lot of people seem to be very superficial on these apps. And my boundaries are very clear. Even on my profile, I say I don't want to talk to you about sex. I am not looking for a Friends with Benefits situation. And I'm not going to give you free English classes. Dudes do this thing where they swipe right 100 times, and then just see whatever pops up and matched up with one guy. And he sent me a message that said, and this is a quote, "Very, very, very ugly." And another guy sent me a message in Spanish that basically says, "What a fucking dog." And so I sent him a troll face, that image of the troll face laugh meme.

And then I screenshotted and put it on my Instagram and my Facebook, I made it public, and said, If you know this motherfucker, tag him and send it to his mother, I would get stuff like that a lot, or people immediately, "Oh, it says on your profile, you don't want to talk about sex? Why don't you like sex?" Like I'm frigid or something because I don't want to talk to that. Because I want to know that you actually have a brain in your head, as opposed to know that you're capable of grinding your genitals against another person. God forbid you use your brain. It's really such a turn off to me to discuss sex with someone who is not my partner, really. I'm not opposed to it, but I'm not going to just jump into it. Right off the bat. I don't even fucking know you. And they expect that. When I'd say "Oh, well, maybe we could meet and have a glass of wine or something." And they'd be like, "Is that all? Are we just going to have a drink? Or are we going to have a good time?" They want guaranteed ask before even leaving the house. And I am not about that life. That does not work for me. That is not what I want. And if you could read, this is clearly stated on my profile. And when I said that to someone he said like definitely they don't have it. Yes. Which basically means stop talking stupid. And I just decided this is not good for my mental health. It's truly not, this is not good for me. Do I want to keep opening myself up to abuse from absolute strangers? No, I'm not the best looking one out there. I am aware, I got more roles than Pillsbury. At times. I know this. These are things I am open and honest with and have written articles about. But just because I'm a big girl. And just because I'm not, "pretty" doesn't mean that I'll take any deck that comes at me. It doesn't mean I shouldn't be grateful that you even spoke to me. And it doesn't mean that you get to abuse me. Absolutely not. I will not stand for it. And when you put boundaries down and when you let people know that you won't take their shit. They get angry, they get offended and in their feelings. And I'm just not here for it. Fuck their feelings. I have them too.

Tag flash for an inch share across your social media networks. It's really important to share these stories. Since you are enjoying this episode. All right on to the rest of the show. Next we have Adoma and Adoma is so lovely. I really enjoyed her episode. And in her episode she talks about moving from London to Toronto. And we had such a key talking about dating abroad. So I'll let her tell you all about it.

ADOMA [00:39:49] Being a Black woman dating here. I do definitely see a difference in the way Black women are able to navigate the dating world In North America, as compared to in London, I think, here I see a lot more interracial dating, particularly Black men, not dating Black women. And I think that surprised me, because I don't see that as much in the UK, obviously, it's still there, but I see is very prominent here. So I'd actually say that's probably been probably been my most difficult element of moving here is that, I guess I had an idealistic vision that I'm going to move here and meet my husband. But it's actually been a lot more difficult than that, because I will unapologetically say that I am a very big supporter of Black love, I'm looking for a Black husband, I want my kids to be fully 100% Black, and finding Black men who date strong Black

woman here has definitely been an eye opener, I'd say and a work in progress. It could be because of the circles that I hang out in. I'm very much a Northwest London girl where it's very predominantly Black. So maybe I've just not been exposed to interracial dating as much. But here it is very, very prominent, more prominent than I would see in the UK.

CHRISTINE [00:41:18] Definitely Adoma and I really got into this conversation, I did wonder if a certain extremely famous Toronto rapper who is undeniably successful, and undeniably a bop maker, but arguably quite corny for at least women who've had some experiences who've seen some things. And I wondered if that was indicative of the dating experience in Toronto. I mean, y'all don't come from me, or do I say what I said.

ADOMA [00:41:54] So you see exactly what you just said about Connie. That is exactly what it is. And I think maybe if you spoke to a Canadian woman, they'll be like, What are you talking about I we got sweat, your men don't have swag. They've got Drake's swag. But to us, it's Connie. And one of the things that we always get slated as as British, but we say they haven't got any source. And what we mean by that is, maybe that the full witness and the confidence that we see in British men, I don't see it here. One of the biggest pet peeves I have about Canadian men, and I'm going to put this as a public service announcement. The men here are very used to being chased down. They don't do the chasing here. They are very much. Let me sit back and see what you've got. What are you bringing to me? Why should I pick you, whereas the swaq I see from British boys is if I like this person, this woman, I'm gonna go get her because I can't let her go, I see that drive. Where is this laid back attitude that they have of I don't need to put in any work, you need to put in the work for me. I cannot deal. And it's something that I don't know if I'll ever be able to wrap my head around because it's so different to what I'm used to. And then I'll give you a really good example, I joined hinge which is this online dating site. And in my first week here, I match with this guy, and I was like, "Great, maybe I'm gonna find my guy here." So we were talking for a few days. And then he said, "Oh, do you want to meet up on Friday?" I said, "Fantastic. I found a good one." So then it got to maybe Wednesday. And he said, "So what are we doing on Friday?" I said, "Yeah, I'm cool. Like you said, You wanted to meet me. So let's do it." He said, "Okay, so when are you going to book the restaurant? And let me know what time to meet you." I said, "What? What are you talking about? So you've asked me on a date. And now two days before you just thought I was making all the plans, and you were just going to show up?" Again, that might be what some people are used to, but in the world I come from, if a man has asked me on a date, I would like to think that he was taking me out. No. And I'm not used to that waiting for the woman to make all the moves. And you just wait and see. And someone explained it to me in Toronto that there are more eligible women than men, if that makes sense ever more good in inverted commas, women. So when you meet a good in inverted commas, man, they know that there is one man to 20 women. So in his mind, you need to work for me. I can pick between this bunch of you and you haven't got many options. So what are you going to do to be the one whereas I'm not in competition with anybody, you know, I will put my best foot forward but I also expect you to put your best foot forward. So when we say you haven't got any source, if I'm having to text you all the time or I'm having to call the restaurant to make a reservation around I'm having to say good morning to you before you think to text me. Do you know what's not going to happen? You're not going to hear from me because that's not how I move. That's not how I want to be treated. And I don't think this is only my experience speaking to other friends I've met that have moved here. That is their one complaint about finding a man in this city is that they are just too laid back.

CHRISTINE [00:45:26] Alright, we now have Frantzces be other hosts of The Chronicles Abroad podcasts. And also she does so many other wonderful things as well, if you haven't checked out her episode, what are you doing, because her episode really, really talked a lot about mental wellness while abroad, which is so so crucial. And so I asked Frantzces, about her experience dating abroad.

FRANTZCES [00:45:54] I identify as a queer woman. So I mean, finding another queer community is very difficult abroad, there are some pockets like Thailand is very queer friendly. So you, you'll find a lot of people, you know, along the rainbow spectrum there, and it's one of those things that maybe people don't talk about, but people quote, unquote, tolerate it. And I don't like using that word. But you can be gay in Thailand, essentially. Right. But that wasn't something I had to think about because I was getting older. And being somebody who travels often it doesn't lend itself to having stable relationships. And I remember meeting somebody before I went to Japan, but then not being able to continue because I mean, she had no plans of moving abroad or anything like that. So you really have to find somebody who has the same kind of passion for travel as you need to find somebody who is okay with like, uplifting their lives and becoming a little bit nomadic with you. So I came back to the States, not only just for my son, but like to give myself an opportunity to date and maybe find somebody while I was out here that had similar interests and see if that would happen, essentially. But it's one of those trade offs. And so if you are looking to, you know, get in a relationship, you need some form of stability, a little bit, even if you cross paths with people, because what you find is that people will cross paths with people, but they know it's temporary. So it's like, it's just like a fling for that moment. But then you find people who meet each other abroad, and then it becomes something. So it's possible. I've seen it, I've heard it happen, didn't happen to me. But I've heard it happen to people that I've known. So dating abroad. Now as a queer woman,

CHRISTINE [00:47:42] I asked Frantzces to share some insights on finding queer friendly travel and expat locations.

FRANTZCES [00:47:49] The first guy would Google like some of the most queer friendly places, Taiwan is super queer friendly. Like, probably the most queers friendly place I've ever visited. And Thailand is super queer friendly. So do a little bit of research of the countries that are queer friendly, that you would like to live in, you know, obviously, Germany's want to place it and and start doing that research. You know, sometimes it's a trade off, right? I mean, Taiwan gets a little cold in the winter, so you may not have the luxuries of Thailand have been warm all year round. So figuring out what your lifestyle is, and doing a little research of where will be the some of the best places there are queer travelers out there. So definitely, you know, hit them up, follow them on social media. And but there are some places you can't, you just can't do it. There is no utopia. It's all about the trade offs. And what are you willing to trade up, trade over, you know, to live a life that's comfortable for you live a life that feel safe, but just research reach out to folks,

there are plenty of places to go, Japan is a little and but Tokyo is very diverse, you know, so maybe you don't go into the rural parts of the towns. But maybe you go to big cities like Tokyo who their customers some of that stuff,

CHRISTINE [00:49:07] it's so we returned back to here, Barcelona, and we have Chloe, and if you guys remember Chloe's episode, she talked about how she maintained an 11 year relationship being long distance. Yes, while she was all around the world and she maintained a long distance relationship. And so I asked her, do you really talk a little bit about that, but also talk about dating here in Barcelona, from her point of view,

CHLOE [00:49:42] I was in a relationship for 11 years, very very long time. I started dating this person when I was 19. If you asked me if long distance relationships work out I would tell you no, because every other long distance relationship that I've seen, has not worked. It just worked for us. And I see it as a fluke, to be honest, the main reason why it worked for us is because he didn't put any pressure on me. And he allowed me to be me and do what I'm doing. Every year I had this contract, and I would return home and get a new one. And I would always say to him, if this is not what you want, then we can end this, however, I'm not going to give up my dreams for you. I love you, but I'm not going to give up my dreams for you, this is something that I want to do. And he was supportive of that. And then when I was in those countries, there was no pressure in terms of "We have to Skype each other at seven o'clock every day. And if you're not there, it's going to cause an argument. And why aren't you contacting me more? Why are you putting more effort, we didn't have any of that. It literally was, we'll talk when we can, which tended to be most days." But if we couldn't, we couldn't. And we understood, he understood, if I had, if I was off out doing something I understood on his part, we made efforts when we could speak to each other. What I saw from other couples, was that there was a lot of pressure on it. And there were arguments because you didn't get on Skype at seven o'clock, when you said you were done. What does that mean? Who are you with, which ultimately led to all those relationships breaking down every, like I said, every other long distance relationship that I saw with people that I was traveling with, or living with, they didn't last. And it just did for us. And the only thing that I can attribute it to is because there was no pressure on it. He always came to visit, I definitely opened the scope for his travel, because he was one of those people who didn't really travel much through his childhood. And then when I got home, the idea was for us to come to Basel. And together, the issues arise was that what I realized is that ultimately, he didn't want to leave the UK. He was very much attached to it. And he hadn't really been honest with his feelings about leaving the UK. And I knew that I couldn't stay for him and be miserable. And there were many other issues as well. But that was part of it. And ultimately, I think through me traveling and doing various things and wanting certain things because of my travels, we became very different people. Really I always say that the problems arise when we were actually living in the same country, not when we weren't. And then yeah, I came to Barcelona single. And wow, what a trip. Initially, I was in no space to be dating, I was getting over this very long term relationship that had really defined me as an adult. And I had to discover myself first because even though I had gone off, and done all these things, and lived my dreams, I was still part of that unit. And I didn't know myself as an individual. I only knew myself as part of that unit. And I had to learn what it was for me to be an individual before I could even think about dating. And

then once I started, you gotta remember the last time I was single, I was 19. Internet, apps and everything. It wasn't a thing. Now everyone, and particularly in Barcelona, it's all about the apps and I cannot get my head around it at all. It feels so superficial. It feels like you're going shopping, and it takes away that layer of getting to know someone before you write them off. Because like I always say like my ex. I wasn't particularly attracted to him when we first met, but I got to know him. And that grew. And these apps take away that opportunity. And you could be missing out on someone really great because you're so superficially, swiping away and I just honestly, I'm still in a stage of trying to understand and navigate this landscape and trying to understand if it's even something I really want to be a part of. Because so far, my experience of it has been negative. I'm not particularly open to it, I definitely prefer the old school way of just meeting someone and talking to them. Maybe I'm too old for I don't know. But it's not been easy. Because I've been very resistant to this app lifestyle, for sure. And then there's the element of I've never dated outside my race, am I open to it, I'm still trying to figure that out. To be honest, I want to try to be open to it. And I want to attempt because I don't like to write things off without even trying. But I'm conflicted. Because I've always seen myself with a Black man. I've always seen my kids as being Black. I've always seen myself raising my kids within my culture, and not having anything to conflict with that. Because I'm very proud of who I am culturally, my kids will definitely be proud of who they are culturally. And I don't know if I'm open enough to introduce another culture into that Barcelona is not somewhere where there is an abundance of black men, there's hardly any To be honest, many, the ones that are here, tend to be in interracial relationships. So I'm trying to navigate that dilemma as well. Catalan guys as well, don't have a great reputation. They have a reputation as being mommy's boys. And then, you know, there's that element of, are they open to interracial dating? Because a lot of the time on the apps, I get lovin on the apps in person, I get, "Oh, you're very exotic." And I'm like, What does that even mean? Like, I can't, I can't date someone that, you know, treats me like a frigging ice cream, you know, how am I exotic, I'm not a fruit. You know, I'm a person, normal person of this world. And you should be used to seeing people like me. But for you, it's a novelty. And that in itself is an issue for me. I haven't just heard this from Black women. I've heard this from women in general, that dating in Barcelona is terrible. And the app culture is terrible. And it has made the general opinion is that it has really converted men into debaters. That's going to be a controversial statement to say, but I'm saying it, because they no longer have the confidence to come up to you and talk to you. They'll look at you, and then search for you on an app, why wouldn't you come and just talk to, talk to me, or they have an inflated level of self confidence, because they're behind a keyboard behind the screen. And some of these men the things that they're saying you're like, I don't know, if you're on a level to be acting this way. It's created a very confused culture, as far as I'm concerned. And I don't like it at all. I don't like it. I've had men actively, like, stare at me. And then match with me on the app. Because I've just like swipe them to see if they match with me. And they have. I haven't even bothered to continue with that conversation. Because I'm just like, you could have talked to me face to face and the fact that you didn't is problematic for me. And I have male friends that have said it themselves. Like oh, I saw this go on the metro and she was so amazing. So I checked later to see if I could match with her. But why didn't you just go up and say hi, I don't get it. It's just it's eliminated so much natural interaction, these ups and it's really sad is really really hard.

CHRISTINE [00:59:32] Next we returned to Australia with Itiah. And if you remember, it is episode, you know, she was in the process of getting permanent residency. Now I believe she is like maybe one step away from becoming a citizen in Australia. So amazing episode really talking about residency citizenship, but also how to get a job abroad as well. So if you haven't checked that one out, I highly rated amend, of course that you do. But I did ask Itiah about her perspective on the dating scene in Australia. And here's what she said,

ITIAH [01:00:10] the dating scene in Australia. And I'll even say that I can't necessarily blanket statement Australia, per se, I can only speak about Sydney in particular. And I'd say that I didn't think the dating scene was amazing at all. I think it's one of the downfalls of Australia that I think is really unfortunate, is the dynamic between men and women. I was used to according in the state, I found men to be quite forward in their interest, and really into the point that you're just like, I'm not interested, please let me know. But they weren't shy. Whereas here if I'm in real practically asexual, literally doubting like, Okay, my pretty enough, am I not interesting enough? What's going on? Are they interested at all? Do I need to be more forward? How do I need to navigate this, this just feels like a lot of hard work there. So wasn't according seen, my take on part of what's happening is that there's a lot of single sex schools. So my impression is that there isn't this healthy relationship that happens between young people at a young age in terms of how to interact with each other, it was very much if you weren't in the same circle, to begin with, whether that be a friend circle or work circle, or had some prior connection, then people were just a little less likely to come out of their shell and start new conversations. And that's whether it's friendship, or romantic. In general, there was a lot more effort that had to be put into being like, "Hey, hey, you over there, Actually, you know, want to talk to you, I'm interested in you," You almost had to put a sign on your forehead. And that was new. I'd been posting on Facebook about how horrible of a time I was having a dating scene. And I would say this is not just Australians, that was dating, foreigners that were living in Australia, but there's something about Sydney that was bringing this out of them. But my boyfriend and I had become Facebook friends used to mutual friends, kind of earlier in the year and he had been seeing my trials and tribulations and the dating scene and occasionally would like something or comment on something but we hadn't actually met in person yet. It was quite like later in the year that we met in person and I just went over and and thanked him for something he had helped me with earlier in the year and said, Hey, it was nice to meet you in person. And then from there, we started talking some more and then eventually started dating. But it was definitely a hard slog in the beginning, and to the point that I was just like, I think I'm just gonna become a lesbian and she's easier. Just the male dating thing. It was just not it was not it at all.

CHRISTINE [01:02:38] Next we have Annabell and if you remember Annabell's story, she is Jamaican, and she's currently living in Japan as an architectural designer. In her episode, we really talked about her experience with the JET Program, but also her going and getting her master's in Japan, and having amazing projects all around Asia as well, and how to land a job in Japan at an architectural firm, which in my opinion, is not for the faint at heart at all. But I did ask her about her experience dating in Japan, and she had some thought.

ANNABELL [01:03:19] T{here's a very shallow understanding of what blackness is. And there's the over sexualization of black women and taxation of black women, you'll have Japanese guys who they'll just want to try a Black girl, I guess. You have guys who are into hip hop culture or dancehall culture, and they want to have a Black girlfriend to just seal the deal and prove hold Black bear. I've seen a lot through just hanging out with other Black women and just swapping stories, and it's just so bizarre all the time. For me, my problem with dating in Japan is that for me, it's basically been non existent. I find Black women tend to be very educated and tend to really stand firmly in what they believe their thoughts, their worldview. They don't live passively, at least two Black women I've interacted with in Japan nepo. They're very sure of themselves. their opinions are mature. they've they've thought these things through they've, they've evolved in their thinking they have reasons for thinking the way they think and stuff and I can only speak to my friends who have dated Japanese men, or like the brief encounters I've had with Japanese men is like they don't like it in their own women. And they don't make it in any other women either the opinionated thing, it just turns them off, they just want you to be cute, and funny and agreeable. Of course, this is not everyone. I would hope that goes without saying. I'm just speaking in a general overwhelmingly regular all the time. kind of thing. It's just a pattern.

CHRISTINE [01:05:02] Next we have Jackie from the Jackie O' Life. And Jackie's episode was so empowering and so amazing. She is a digital slow mad, she is a single mom of a cute baby girl. And she just really dropped so many gems, and how to really take control of your life and to really steer in the direction you want it to go. Again, if you haven't listened to her episode, you definitely want to, but hear her thoughts on dating abroad.

JACKIE [01:05:38] The highs and the lows about dating abroad. Sometimes I do have a problem being because you're different, right. And men typically are attracted to different, "exotic things." And that can get, for me at least a little annoying. I am an almost six foot tall black woman with dreads to the middle of my back. I can get a lot of attention, particularly male attention, and it doesn't matter whatever country I go to be like Vietnam, countries aren't particularly fond of dark skin, I still get a lot of attention. Be it healthy attention, be it not so healthy attention. I still get it dating can be interesting, just because, one, there's the language and there's the cultural distinctions. One is language, for instance, for me dating in Spanish is not necessarily it's difficult, because my Spanish is barely good. But yet many of the nuances to who I am, are all in English, if that makes sense. I always feel like if I'm dating someone in the Spanish language, do they really get to know like, be authentic complete me. Because I feel like they're still even though my Spanish is fairly good, there's still part of me that is I almost feel like box within the English language, if that makes sense. And then there are various cultural issues. When I think about the whole idea of masculinity and chivalry, particularly in Africa and South and Central America. Men can be very, very chivalrous in ways that I never really experienced in the United States of America. And the sense of opening doors, buying flowers. If you've ever dated Nigerian men, they are over the top in terms of gifts and writing love letters and all that stuff. For me, that can be a little bit too much. And I'm also very independent woman, it's just navigating all of that, and just trying to figure that out. And then understanding that as a US passport holder, that is something that is very desirable. Understanding that everybody who's trying to date you does not have the best intentions and be able to decipher through that and

some guys will go all out to like date the blue passport holder and just having that in the back of your head as well before you go and fall head over heels for somebody. And six months later, you married to somebody in the band. He got his papers, and he was on with the next one. Immigration doesn't happen that quickly. But I'm just telling a story. But overall, I've enjoyed it. I've enjoyed it, like particularly African men appreciating my blackness. And my boldness, I would say in many ways, there's so much that I see in African Americans they don't even realize is like hell, African. I look at most black women. I'm like, Oh, yeah, you got some Yoruba blood. And you definitely the stuff that you refuse to tolerate that comes back to your Africanist. And I think particularly African men, they just appreciate that. And I also feel like African men of the diaspora, so all over the world. And that's the amazing thing when you can date melanated people from all over the world.

CHRISTINE [01:08:47] Next, we have Kelley from burn bright. And her episode was all about how to take your career in social work abroad to Italy and to England, and also about the symptoms of burnout and how to resolve it something that I think as Black women, we just have not been educated enough. And I know I hadn't realized I was burned out until many, many years until I actually got that language. And we actually continued that conversation on Instagram. And so there's an Instagram Live that we did a couple of weeks ago. So if you haven't watched that, I highly recommend it because not only do we talk about her experiences in London in Italy, we talked about dating, but we also talked about softness. Yeah. And how living abroad for her. And actually a lot of the people in the audience have the same experience is that living abroad had brought some softness into their life. And that was a beautiful exchange. And I think it's really interesting to frame softness in the context. Dating as well. I think it's definitely in alignment with living a life well lived in all the possibilities to really be completely expressed. And that includes softness in any way that resonates with you. I say all that to say, I asked Kelley, what was dating in England in Italy, like for her.

KELLEY [01:10:26] Lovely, a lot easier than it was in the States. I found European men, much more respectful, and much more communicative European men to me, understood the concept of needing to talk before expecting anything in return. Yeah, it's normal to want to get coffee, to talk on the phone, to expect a level of socialization before an expectation of anything more. And in America, that's not always the case. Or it's what we texted a couple times. So should there be more? I'm somebody who craves true connection with people. That's just who I am, I need to know you, I need to talk about really deep things. And I would go to a pub, and I would have that conversation. Just randomly with anybody, frankly, like not even in a dating situation. But in a dating situation, that was like an expectation. Well, yeah. Like, let's have a conversation about what's going on or what you think about this? Or what's your story? Where are you from? What was your life like in America? Or what's this about for me that made dating a joy. And I loved every second of it, I loved that piece of getting to know someone and having them get to know me, and not feeling pressure in any way. I really enjoyed that. I just found it much more social, much more enjoyable, I found that people actually really dated, which was kind of nice. I feel like our culture has lost that there is an art to dating. And I feel like Americans are losing that to a degree that we don't really date anymore. And I found that was a lot easier to do in England. dating in Italy was weird. It was, it was weird. Northern Italian wasn't like really weird, not not a

particularly amazing experience for me with Northern Italian men, Southern Italian was better. And then a lot of times I just ended up dating other European men, just because for Northern Italian men, all the things I mentioned about what my experience was of them. And they're in the weirdness of interacting with women who are single and then Black women who are single, it was just weird. Like, it was really hard to kind of make small talk with them because it wasn't a small talk culture. For northern Italian men, Southern Italian were much more friendly, much more outgoing, much more like how are you and much more forthright and like joking and jovial and much more lighter. I found some of the Northern Italian men a little too serious. But again, that was my experience. I don't want to broad brushstrokes. Some people found great experiences with them, not particularly me, I found Southern Italian men much more fun and engaging like the Florentine men. And further down were lovely, like the men from Florence and further down where we're fine. But as a whole, I really didn't have a lot of great dating experiences with Italian men in general. I mostly ended up dating men who are from other countries in Italy.

CHRISTINE [01:13:49] I hope you enjoyed this episode. And if you are like, I need more any more about this? really trying to go abroad this year, and you're really trying to have a business, I think you should probably get at me. That's all I'm saying. But you know, that's just me. All right.
